A huge shock awaited me though when I was six and we moved to London and there were more in one year group than in the whole school in the lovely village.. But that's another story........

Biblical commentary III

GIVING TO CHARITIES READING: MATTHEW 6 v 1-4

One of the difficulties of keeping biblical instruction in the 21st century is that it does not always appear to sit well with modern life. This is particularly true in the case of charitable giving. On a large scale we have the TV charity days such as Children In Need. All that publicity, yet we are urged in scripture to give in secret. What are we to do? If we want to give on these big occasions then we can request that we are "anonymous" and hope people will respect our wishes.

On a smaller scale there is the increasing tendency for charities to "reclaim the tax" so that the amounts given are worth more. Of course, having to fill in a form and declare your intentions means that your giving is no longer secret. However, it's not as if it is public knowledge because only the treasurer and secretary of the charity may know of your intentions. It is surely the case that this is not "trumpeting" your generosity. There will also be other times and opportunities where your giving *can* be entirely secret. Dropping coins in a box, for example, where the collector is not known to you.

St Ives Eco-Action Faith Communities initiative

Mary Cox and I met on 7th July by Zoom with members of other St Ives churches and with a link to Tony Pearson of St Pauls C of E in Cambridge, with an active eco-church group working towards its silver eco-church award. Helen Dye who is on the steering group of St Ives Eco Action was also present. Mary Gatehouse of the Methodist church chaired this meeting, but there will be a range of chair people.

This meeting aimed to share what each person or church was trying to achieve or had already done to combat climate change. Mary Cox spoke about Green Christian, and her involvement in radical Christian lobbying for the climate, including organised protests. Mary Gatehouse spoke on behalf of herself and Mary Cox about the A Rocha Eco Church awards and the fact that applying for this prestigious and now well-established credential made the congregation think about every aspect of their own and their church's efforts to become eco-friendly. Mary also told us of the United Nations Association call for a Climate Focus Service on or after 6th September 2020, the date designated as "Climate Sunday".

Helen Dye said she was impressed by the way churches acted at a local level but also cared very much about the plight of people in developing countries and had a worldwide view.

Local church initiatives include the process of divesting of fossil fuel investments, assessing an individual's carbon footprint, evaluating efficiency of the new heating system at the Methodist church, a recipe book containing meat-free alternatives, the Holywell wildflower campaign, and exploring storage facilities such as refrigeration for the St Ives Food Bank. Modernisation of the Anglican Church in St Ives will include consideration of its carbon footprint and, although adhering to rules for listed buildings can be difficult, it is not insurmountable.

There is a feeling that other faiths and non-faith groups could also become involved in this Faith Communities initiative, linked to the St Ives Eco Action group: it wants to be all-inclusive. Mary Cox stressed the need to inform Churches Together St Ives (CTSI). The area targeted will include villages close to St Ives.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 4th August at 10.30am by Zoom. For an invitation, please contact either Mary (<u>mary@jmcox.co.uk</u>) or Helen Dye (<u>stivesecoaction@gmail.com</u>). The aim is to get to know other people interested in joining a faith communities network to share practical experiences and to work together to maximise our impact.
