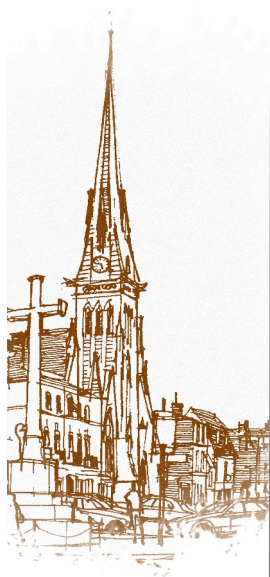

## News From Traidcraft

### Traidcraft goes back to the future with a new pioneering plan for ethical trade.

The Board of Traidcraft has accepted a plan for the future of the plc which has room for 12 employees and will begin its work at the start of 2019. It will maximise the profitable parts of the business, phase out loss-making lines, create a membership culture and set a new high bar for ethical trading in the UK.

As such, Traidcraft wishes to build on the extraordinary success of fair trade for a new generation of trading, sourcing and buying, in the manner of its pioneering fair trade founders. At its heart is an aspiration to make transparent the costs, prices and profits involved in every product it sells, which carries on the fair trade tradition of challenging and disrupting the market.

CEO Robin Roth said: "We want our members to be co-conspirators in changing how trade is understood and practiced. We want to tell consumers who gets what from the Traidcraft products they buy. We want to annoy and irritate those who profit unduly through the non-transparency of their trading activities. We will cause good trouble, just as those six fair trade pioneers who started Traidcraft did back in 1979."

"Traidcraft has transformed shopping in the UK, and now you can find fair trade everywhere, from online shops to petrol stations. But as times change, so must we. When new markets are searching for goods that are ethical, vegan and organic as well as fair trade, we need to be there. As younger people demand cooperative models of doing business, we need to strive for that too."

Traidcraft will initially focus more deliberately on its established partners and advocates, who are predominantly active in Christian churches. Traidcraft's 4,300 Fair Traders, 85% of whom are motivated by faith, will be able to access a new version of the company they already do business with. Further to this, products will be available to all consumers through the online Traidcraft shop and by mail order.

Returning the business to profit will involve a simpler range of products. The new Traidcraft will:

- establish core grocery lines
- carry fewer craft lines
- encourage communities to buy cooperatively and in bulk, saving on packaging and benefitting the planet deliver discounts through a membership model for supporters.

All of Traidcraft's 67 members of staff have faced redundancy through the legal consultation process; 22 of whom chose voluntary redundancy, and a further 45 were issued notices of redundancy. There will be 12 roles available within the future plan for the organisation, which all staff will be welcome to apply for. Around 10 additional members of staff will remain on an extended contract for a transitional period.

## FROM THE CHURCH SECRETARY

Ice, frozen waterfalls and snow are associated with January. This winter I travelled to Iceland and experienced wintertime as never before. I have come back joyful that we are an eco-friendly church as I came to appreciate the adverse impacts of global warming and the effort that we all need to put into slowing the decline. We had made a quick decision to add in an extra trip. It had seemed a good idea at the time!



Our day trip took us into the untouched beauty and raw nature of Langjökull, Iceland's second largest glacier. It translates as 'Long Glacier' and covers about 950 square km. The views were stunning as we stepped out on the ice cap, enjoying the view for miles of virgin snow and clear changing skies.

Iceland only has daylight between 11am and 4pm at this time of year. The beauty seemed to make standing

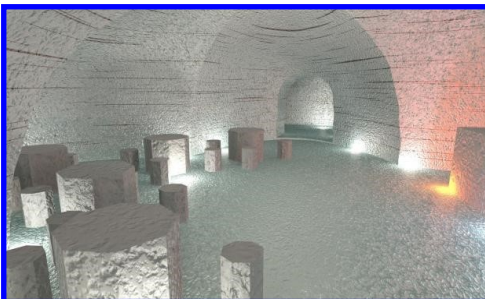
outside at minus 15 degrees worth the effort. My heart missed a beat when it was disclosed that we would then enter the 500m man-made tunnel for an hour's walk to learn the basics of glacier knowledge.

Centuries of snowfall have been compacted to form a river of ice that slowly slips downhill under the influence of gravity. Nevertheless, global warming poses a very real threat. The rate of retreat has gradually been increasing and the glacier has shrunk. While most scientists say it has 150 years left before the ice has completely melted, the worst-case scenarios give it a life expectancy of just 65 years.



Iceland without ice! This would also contribute to rising sea levels. Icelanders are very environmentally conscious, and it does seem such a shame that they would be one of the first affected islands by the loss of land at sea level, where most of the

population of some 350,000 people live.



We went deep inside the man-made tunnels to the blue heart of the glacier. I must admit that I felt slightly anxious, and a bit too close to my Maker. To my surprise, at the centre, was a small chapel and altar carved out deep in the glacier, where weddings are conducted. We were invited to sing, and the acoustics were tremendous. It certainly was an unexpected worship experience for us and gave me the chance not to miss my choir practice albeit from a far distant place.

I was glad to surface and board the modified army glacier vehicle which took us off the glacier in the dark and to a hot islandic meal. A few hours later we were back in the hotel. The houses are beautifully warm inside. Langjökull glacier feeds Pingvallavatn, Iceland's largest natural lake. As Iceland is a volcanic island, ironically this frigid body of ice is also responsible for some of the country's natural occurring hot springs. It might be cold water that seeps out of the glacier, but the geothermal energy created by the volcanoes soon heats it up. The hot steam and water are piped for miles creating a source for central heating and hot water. But I must admit, that it is good to be safely back home!

I recently spent a delightful time with one of our great granddaughters, Delilah Grace, aged 5. A bright and inquisitive child whose favourite words at the moment – and for some time to come, I suspect - are “what?” and “why?”

Great granny, who is very old, must surely know the answers to every question?

I accept that curiosity should be encouraged in a child, but being ‘The Fount of all Wisdom’ to a 5-year old is not an easy task, especially if, like me, you have quite a few ‘what’s’ and ‘why’s’ of your own.
