



Remembering Allan Forrest...... 1925 – 2018.

Allan, who died just before Christmas, was born in Glasgow in 1925 but moved to New Barnet in London as a child. During the war he briefly lived back in Scotland but soon moved back to London where he continued his involvement in the local church and where he met Eileen, the love of his life!



Allan served in the RAF as a wireless operator during and after the war. When he was demobbed he had to decide what to do with life and decided that he wanted to be a miller, a decision he never regretted! He learned his craft "on the job" and by correspondence course. His first post as a mill manager was at St Neots. By now he and Eileen were married and the family grew rapidly with the arrival of their three little girls, Heather, Fiona and Lorna. Jobs in other mills followed and he became a tutor on the correspondence course, developing and encouraging others to develop the craft of milling. He even built his own "Midget" mill so he could refine his ideas and develop new techniques. He was key to the development of high quality wholemeal flour which is so popular nowadays. His last job brought them to Houghton in 1987 where he became Custodian at the famous National Trust mill. These were happy times and he and Eileen immersed themselves in village life, worshipping when they could at Houghton Chapel. He served as Treasurer of the Houghton Chapel Retreat Centre for many years. Throughout this time Allan continued to tutor people all over the world in the skills of milling and he was awarded the MBE in 1994 for his services to the milling industry. The photo above was taken at Buckingham Palace when he was presented with his medal.

When he finally "retired" they moved in to St Ives although he still passed on his knowledge to the new custodian at the mill; some of the artefacts on show there were donated by Allan. Now no longer working at weekends he and Eileen joined the Free Church and soon became very involved. They helped in Tookey's regularly for 14 years, also stewarding, preparing communion and helping with the Lunch Club and Snack Bars. Their infectious good humour and genuine interest in everyone they met brought so much to these roles and to our fellowship here at the Free Church.

Allan was a true gentleman, someone of great humility and a much loved Member who will be truly missed. Our sincere condolences to Eileen and all the family.

I was born just before the war in the East End of London to a mother aged only seventeen. My parents were very poor and produced 6 children in quick succession. By the time I was three I had two siblings. When the war started I was the first to be evacuated. This was to prove to be one of my first blessings.

Coming from a poor and unloving home I was transported to a

Christian home full of love. I had new clothes for the first time in my life and I was known to swank in my lovely dress and white shoes and socks. It was at this time that I was introduced to the lovely Flower Fairy stories which I love to this day. I learned to love Sunday school. I was to live with them until I was 12. They are still my family and I have a war-time brother and sister.

I used to go to London for a week or two just to keep in touch with my family but my mother couldn't relate to me because I was too "posh". She was glad when I went back!

On one such visit when I was about 12 years old I went into the Methodist church for Sunday school. Stanley was the Sunday school superintendent. He was sixteen years old! He said that he knew from that moment that he would one day marry me....and he did...another big blessing!

I am sitting in my study about to do my singing exercises for the day ...another big blessing and I am reminded of all the wonderful gifts God has given to me. As some of you already know; I didn't realise that I had a good singing voice until I was in my seventies! I thank God and my dear friend Michael for this. Now I have a wonderful new interest in my life. What a wonderful gift I was given - and at such a late stage in my life!

He doesn't stop at one or two...He continues to bless us with gifts through every hour of every day.

In church, I look around me at the lovely faces of all my friends and realise how fortunate I am! God has blessed me with so many gifts. I couldn't begin to count them as there are so many and they come in so thick and fast from the time I awaken in the morning. when I hear the birds singing until I see the bright moon when I close my eyes at night ready for sleep. I thank the Lord for the music of life that we take so much for granted like the sound of someone laughing or we see a baby's smile.

Give us wisdom to enter this day with good sounds, tones and pitches and words that affirm, encourage, cherish, our sounds affecting the world in a positive way.

Lent Collection for Traidcraft Exchange Suggested donation £1 per Sunday In the Traidcraft basket

As you will have heard Traidcraft, like many other businesses, has recently had a tough trading time. Traidcraft has decided to continue trading, but to reduce their range of goods. Over 8,000 artisans and producers stand to lose their jobs or experience a decline in their income as a result, with producers from India and Bangladesh among the worst affected.



To help their suppliers through this difficult time Traidcraft Exchange has made an appeal for funds. The February Church Meeting agreed to support this appeal with a collection through Lent, suggesting a donation of a £1 each Sunday. The first Sunday will be 15th March, and there will be a Traidcraft basket to receive donations at the back of the church.

Hand-embroidered card manufacturer Swajan, (above) based in Bangladesh, employs over 750 people, many of them women. Traidcraft Exchange said the company faces a 65 per cent fall in orders. 'For years artisans from poor and isolated regions have been able to sell to the UK fair trade market. Now that existing deals are coming to an abrupt end we owe it to them to cushion the blow and help them chart a new future,' said Kate Dixon, spokesperson for Traidcraft Exchange. 'Every supplier has different needs — some will need help finding alternative fair trade buyers and some will need short term direct financial support.

What: Campaigns workshop focused on Christian Aid's climate campaign, The Big Shift

These impacts are already being felt in some of the poorest communities, so for Christian Aid; this is absolutely a matter of justice.

But the solutions do exist; we just need the prophetic imagination and political will to get us there. We need to come together and get powered up for climate justice.

We hope you'll join us at our campaigns roadshow events to learn more about the Big Shift, a campaign to stop the biggest banks funding climate change. And more importantly, to pray, reflect and plan how you and your community can respond. There'll be an opportunity to take action together.

This for us was on the right as you enter and three or four rows from the front. Lo and behold we were in the midst of those Bill called the "Bishops Bench" without being aware of it!.

And what wonderful fellowship we became blessed with in the ensuing years, later to be joined by David and Josie Viles, then Stan and Rosemary Whiffen, meeting twice a year as a group of Ministers and wives. Those of us who are still around still meet twice a year at the Manse by kind invitation of Catherine, joined by one or two other friends involved in ministry of some kind. A very welcoming and happy beginning for Hazel and myself continues at the Free Church to this day. Praise the Lord!

A chance to be themselves

The YMCA's family intervention work is one of the programmes funded by Christian Aid. Weekend camps are organised at their centre in Beit Sahour, near Bethlehem in the West Bank, bringing together counsellors, trainers, young boys who have faced imprisonment and their families for team building. They take part in fun games designed to create team spirit and confidence as well as developing leadership skills. Tree stumps, set in the grounds of the buildings in Beit Sahour, are used for balancing and team spirit building while the swimming pool and adjoining hard area amenities encourage sporting activity. Many of these young boys, especially those from the refugee camps, have not had the luxury of being able to play sports because open spaces and facilities are non-existent in the camps and limited or of poor quality in the West Bank.

Twice yearly away days are also arranged for the wives, mothers and sisters involved with those needing counselling. These days away are vital to the women as they provide them with a safe and secure environment with the chance to meet others in the same situation. Swimming in the onsite pool is always the highlight, with laughter filling the air as stress is released and problems shared. Many of the women struggle to understand the changes in their children after time in jail and want to keep them safe. However the young men want to be out with friends and this causes friction. The women know this may lead to more trouble and arrests and so continually worry. It is often the women who will keep a family going when husbands or sons are in jail.

So for the young men and their families these away days are a chance to recoup, refresh and revitalise as they continue to live with the difficulties experienced as a result of the Israeli occupation.
