An article on Global Debt sent in by Mary Cox.



The good news is that **last week G20 governments committed to suspend \$12 billion of debt payments for 77 countries** in the global south for the rest of 2020. This decision will give these countries vital room for manoeuvre as they deal with the ongoing threat of the pandemic.

It's a breakthrough in our campaign, and it couldn't have been achieved without the massive mobilisation from people like you in the UK, working with Jubilee Debt Campaign and more than 200 organisations around the world.

But there is still a long way to go. Last week's deal only covers debt payments owed to (some) individual lender countries. It doesn't include the further \$12.4 billion of debt payments due to global institutions like the IMF and World Bank in 2020. And it doesn't include the \$10.1 billion of debt payments due to private lenders like banks and hedge funds in the rest of 2020. This money is still due to flow out from countries fighting the devastating Covid-19 pandemic over the course of this year.

So congratulations on contributing to this breakthrough for the campaign. Powerful people are no longer discussing if debts are a problem in the coronavirus crisis, but how to deal with that problem. That is a result of our combined efforts.

But we will need to keep up the pressure in the coming weeks and months.

When asked what she was missing most at present, Josie Viles sent in the following:

We miss visits from our children and grandchildren. We always had a list of tasks for the grandchildren, like changing lightbulbs and bits of DIY. Now we keep in touch on the phone.
