Hadge Yeandle

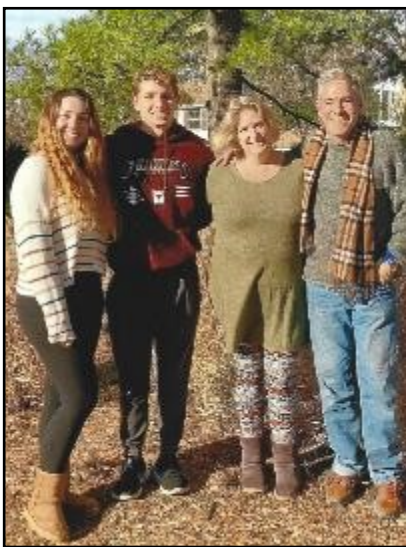

BEREAVEMENT GROUP AT THE FREE CHURCH

When a person is bereaved they can be left wondering whom to turn to. It can be a problem and the advice is not always prominently displayed or easily found.

To lose any loved one is a traumatic experience, but sometimes to lose a husband, wife or partner can be even more devastating. Often it leaves a person completely on their own and wondering what is next, barely able to think or function.

Having personally experienced that loss of my very dear and loved husband, I can talk about this first hand. But I must stress that every death of a loved one is different and yet in many cases sets each person on the same path of life without that loved one. It sets the course for many a person who now finds themselves bereft and facing having to build a completely new solitary and often lonely life.

No longer able to share and talk things over to decide what to do as you have done for years with them, you are faced with deciding what to do on your own. For some ladies in particular you are suddenly having to face driving and taking care of the car, silly things like "how to check tyre's pressure" or "where is the oil dip stick" and "how do I check the water for the screen wash". For others men or woman maintenance of their property and for men in particular preparing meals just for one. So many, many things I cannot list them all here.

Many organisations can offer help in the form of a volunteer to visit you, or talk on the telephone or email if that is what you want. One such organisation is "Cruse Bereavement". But If in doubt ask your Doctor, they should have a number of organisations to refer you to including Cruse but also other NHS care lines as well. Even the people who organised the funeral, or your local Minister or Vicar all have good information to give you.

I now run two groups, one of which is held on Mondays 10.30 am to 12.00 Midday in The Free Church Centrum. We make tea or coffee in the Warren Room, which we take through into the church itself. Chairs are laid out for us and we can just talk or sit and listen to and with each other. We do not have designated talks or films or videos. We talk amongst ourselves about our bereavement if we want to, or just talk about day to day life and the things we do knowing that others will all understand. There is no set time, come and go at whatever time you want and suits you.

My sincere thoughts and wishes to everyone one who is bereaved. If you want to know more about my little group please call me please on **07594 979 904**. There is an answerphone and leave a message and your number –and I will call you back.

They both had very early starts and asked us if we would be so kind as to take their little sausage type dog for a walk round the cricket pitch in the morning. They told us to have as much for breakfast as we wished, leave the key under the dustbin and then collect the van as it would ready. When we picked it up, a new engine had been fitted and there was no charge!

Big smile from the husband who said "who knows, one day you might be able to do something for somebody else". What incredible generosity to such scruffy, unknown youngsters in their smelly Afghan coats. I didn't take a note of the address and we were never able to send flowers or thank them properly.
